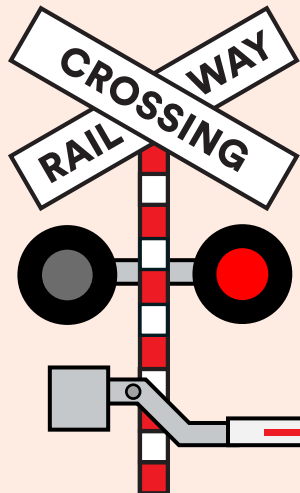
Railway Level Crossings in New Zealand



What types of road railway level crossings (RLXs) are there?

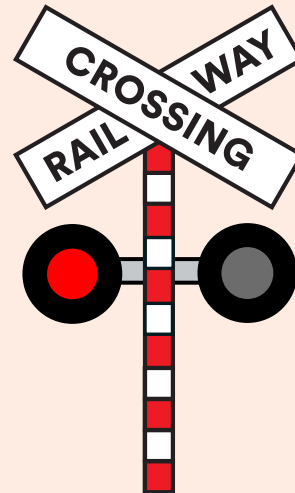
There are **1,147** public road RLXs in New Zealand

698 public road crossings have **active protection**



262 (23%)
have barriers +
flashing lights
and bells

436 (38%)
have flashing
lights and bells



449 public road crossings
have **passive protection**

411 (36%) have
Stop or Give Way
signs

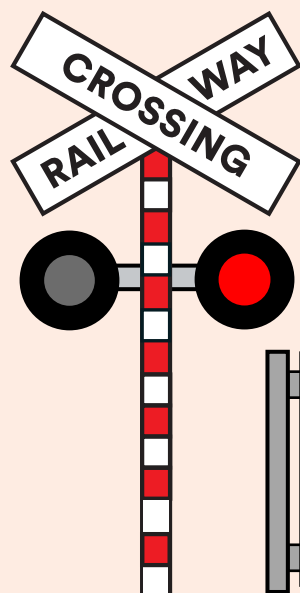




What types of pedestrian railway level crossings (RLXs) are there?

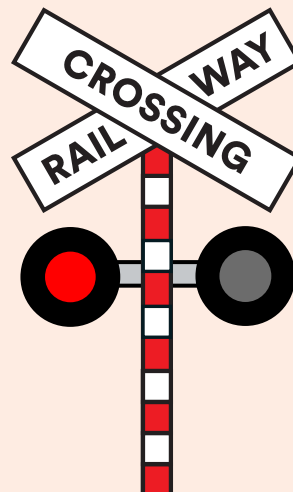
There are **109** public pedestrian RLXs in New Zealand

52 pedestrian crossings have **active protection**



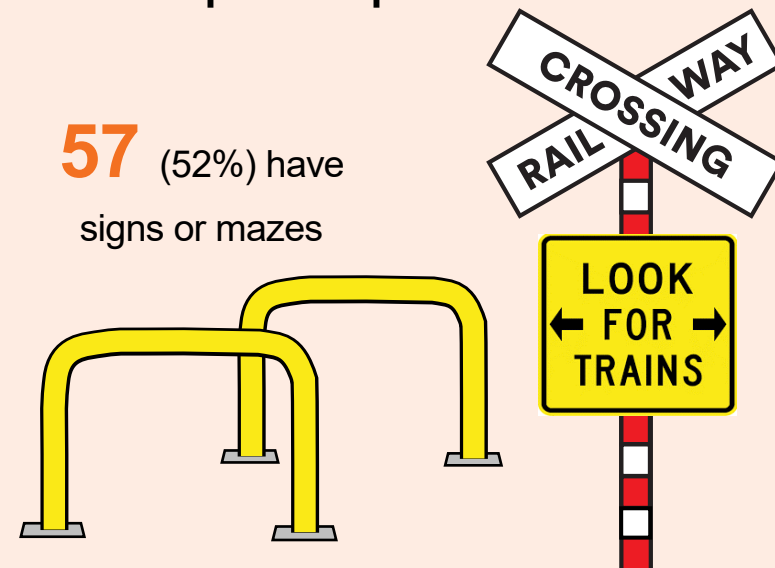
28 (26%) have automatic gates/barriers + flashing lights and bells

24 (22%) have flashing lights and bells



57 pedestrian crossings have **passive protection**

57 (52%) have signs or mazes





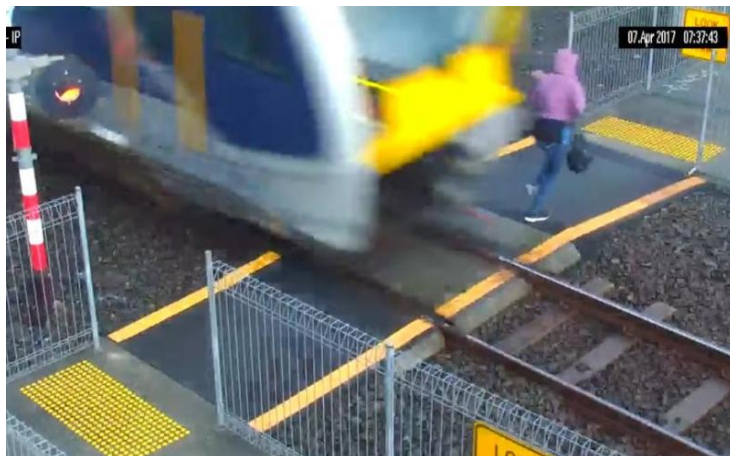

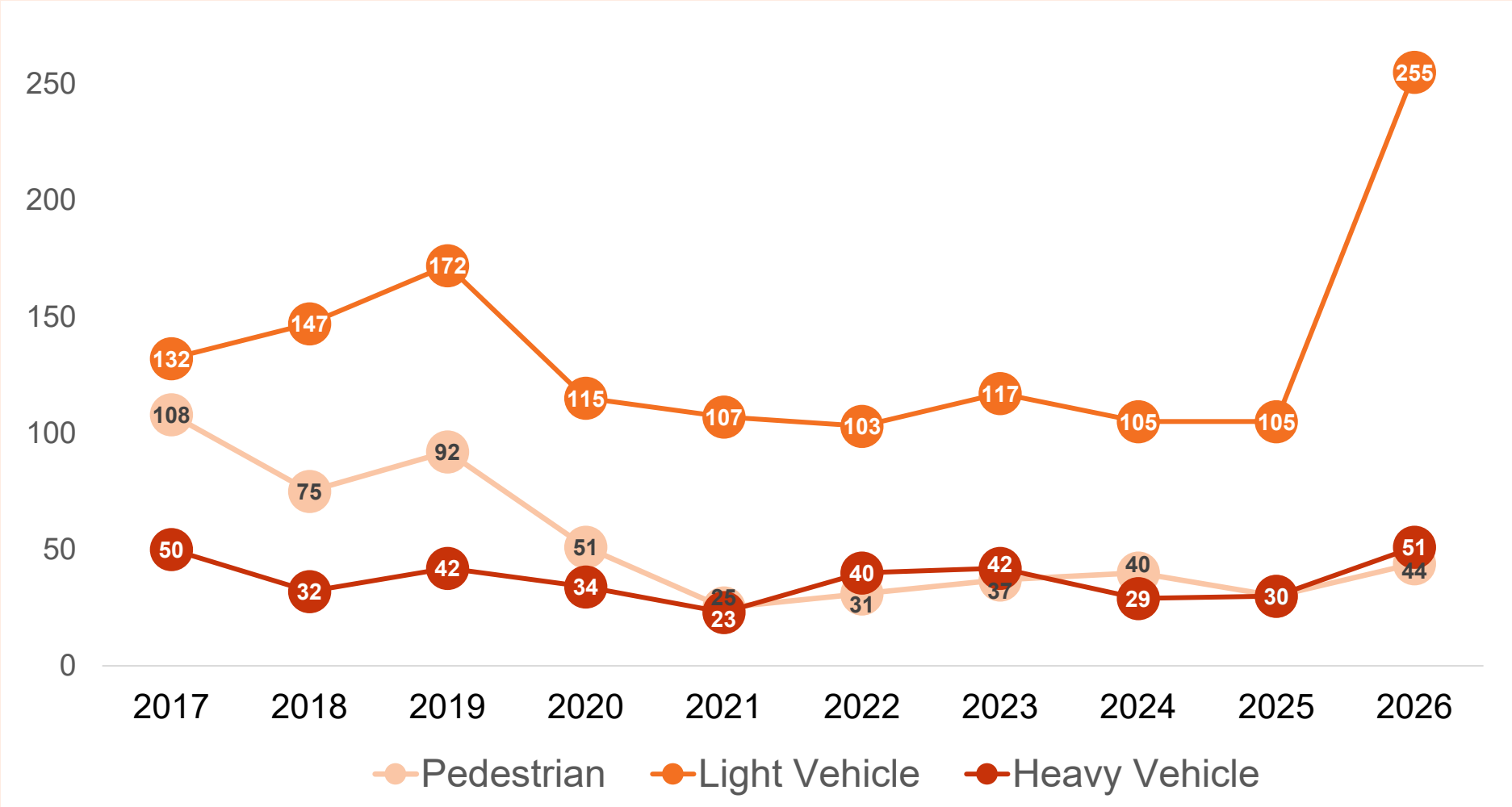

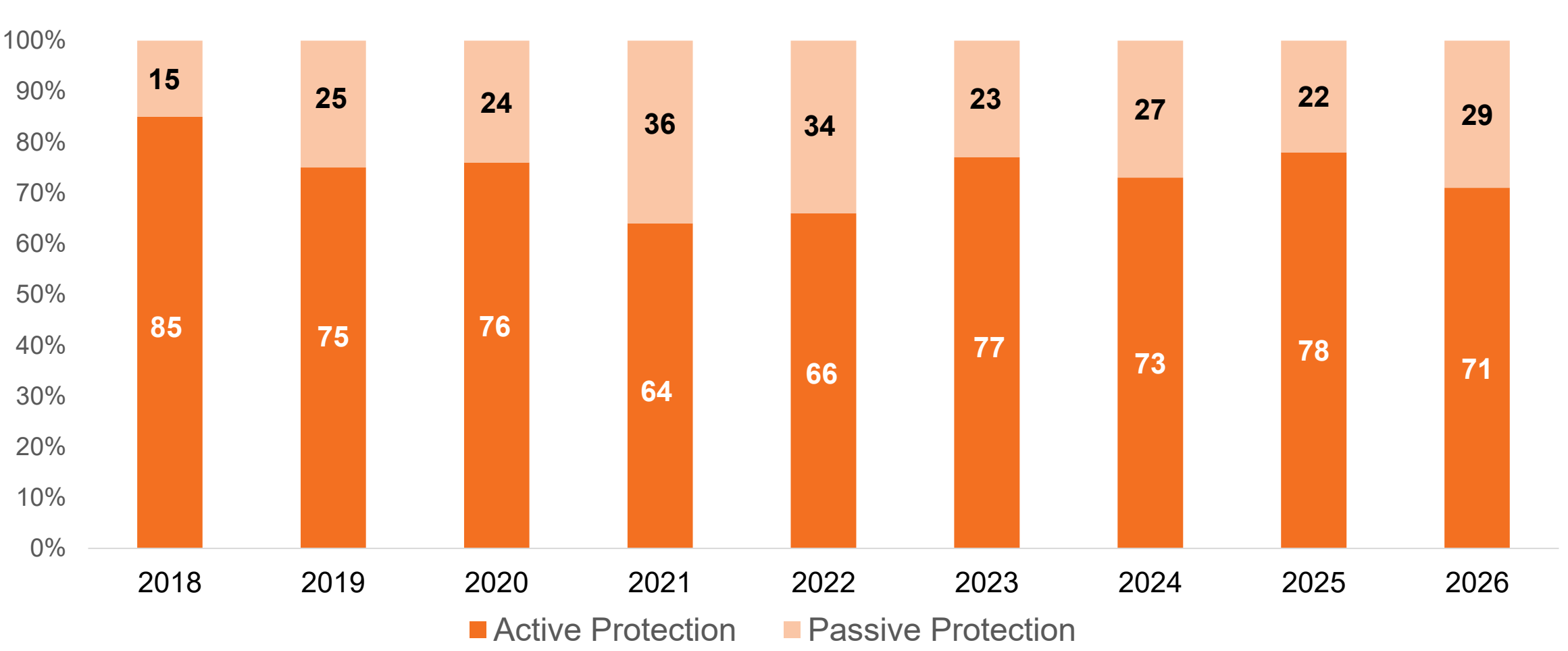


Near Misses at RLXs FY 2017 – FY 2026





Near Misses at RLXs FY 2018 – FY 2026



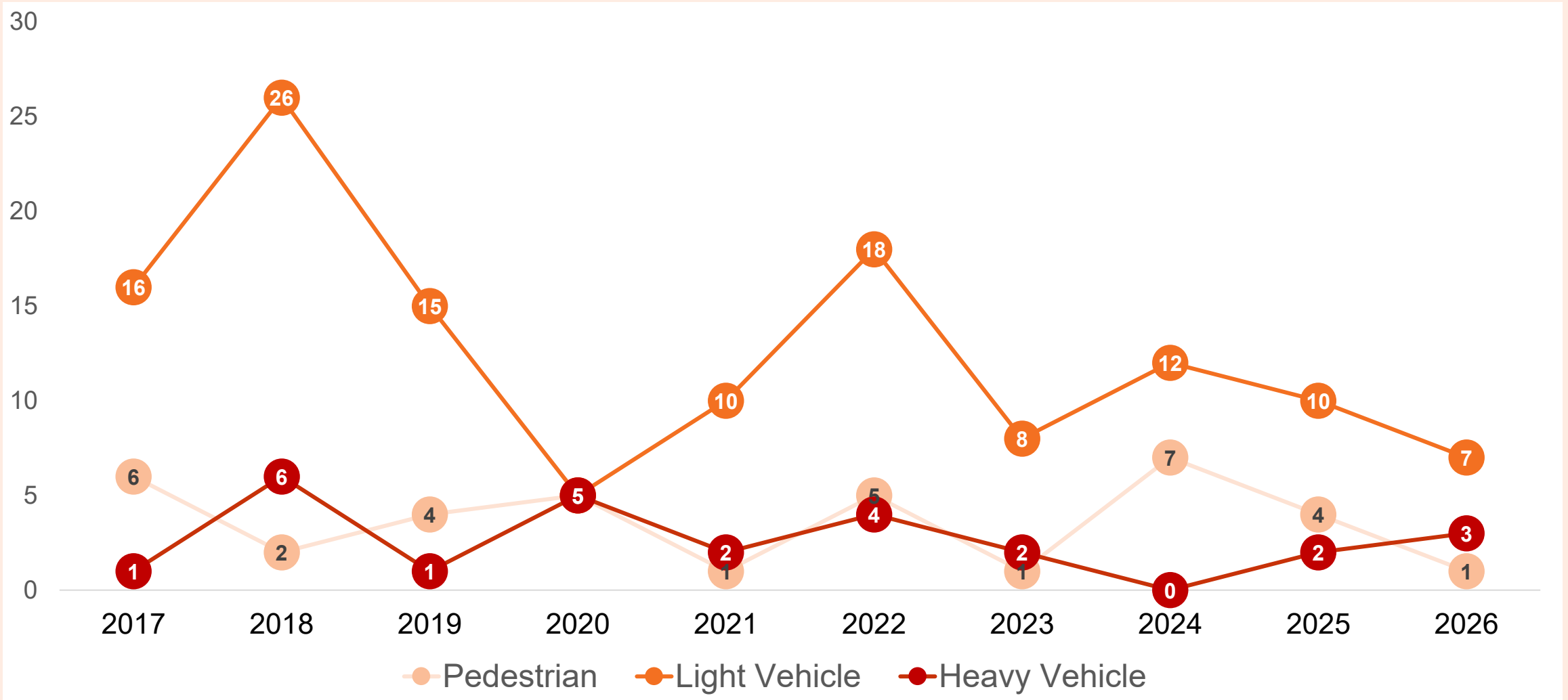
Percentages of near misses occurring at active protection RLXs compared to passive protection

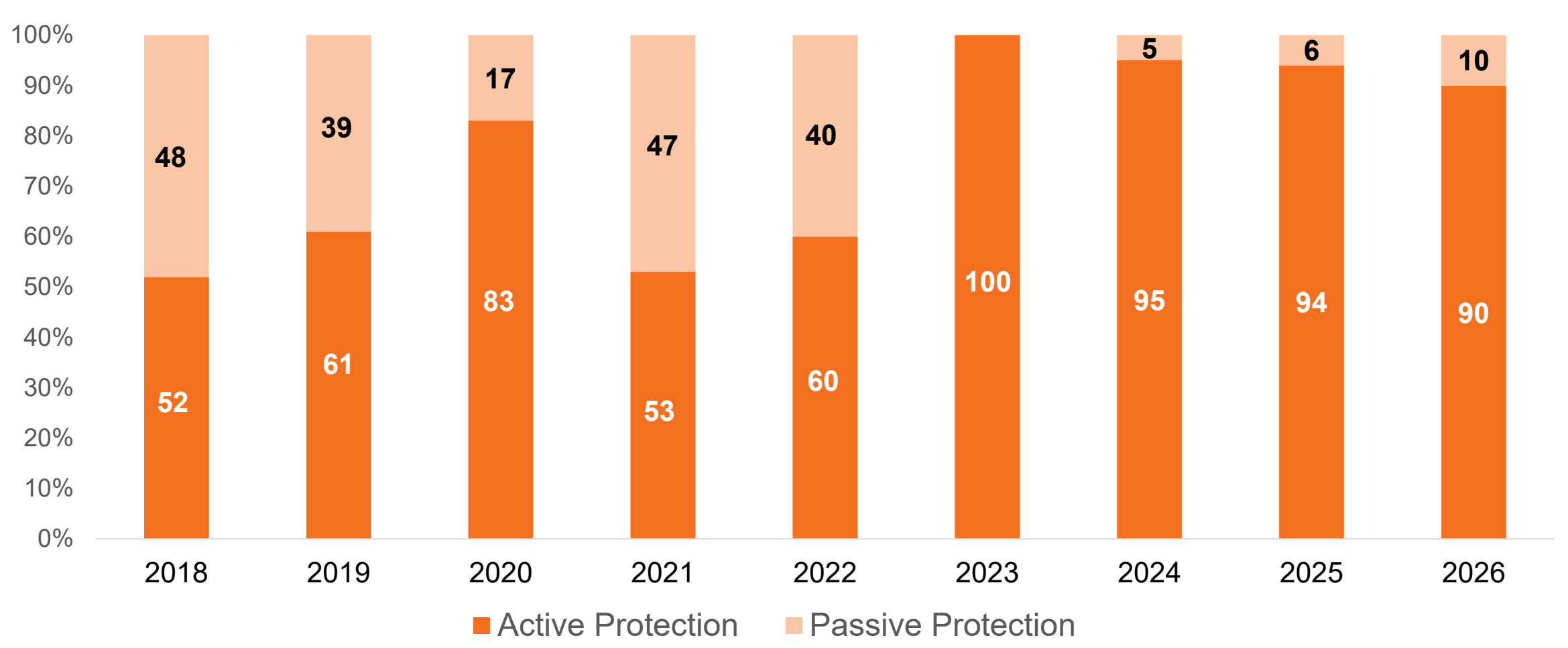

Percentages of collisions occurring at active protection RLXs compared to passive protection

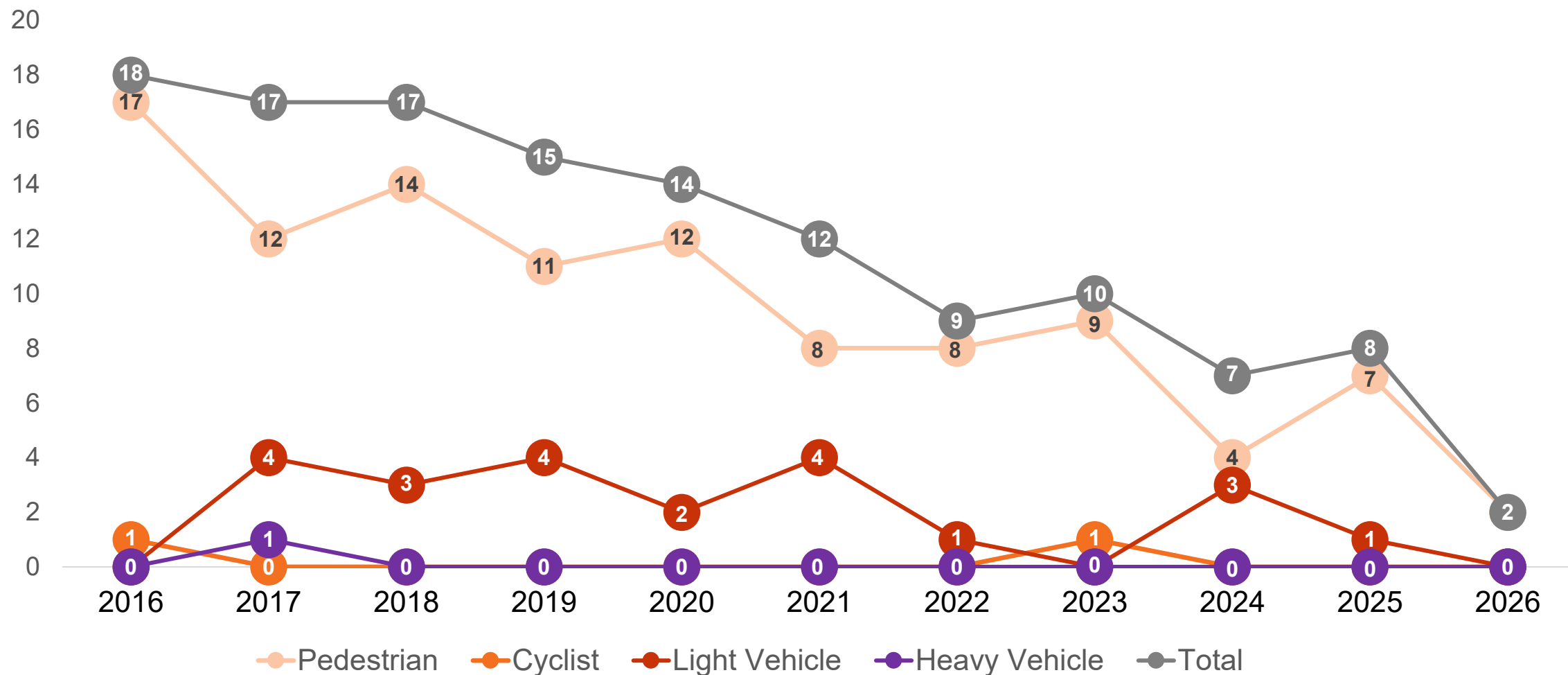

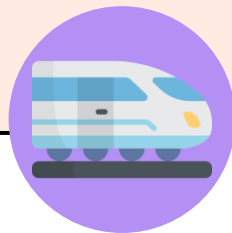

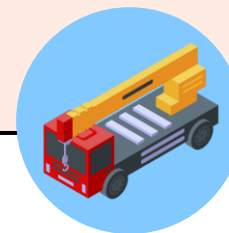
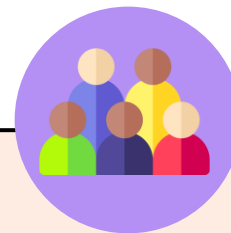

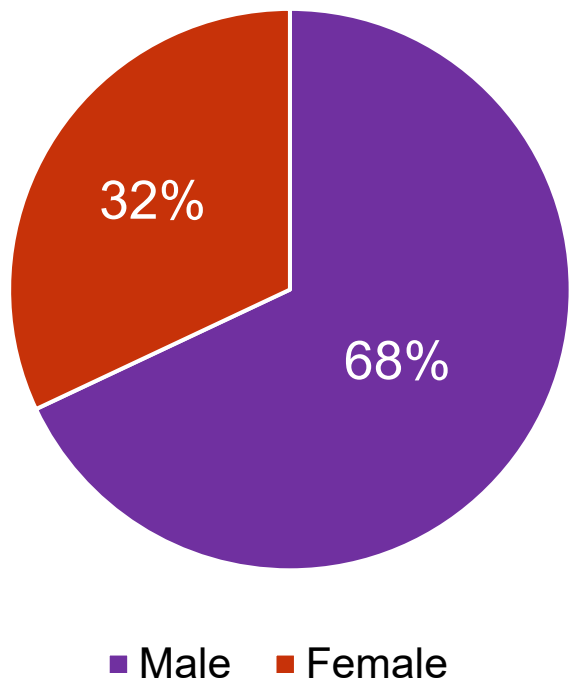

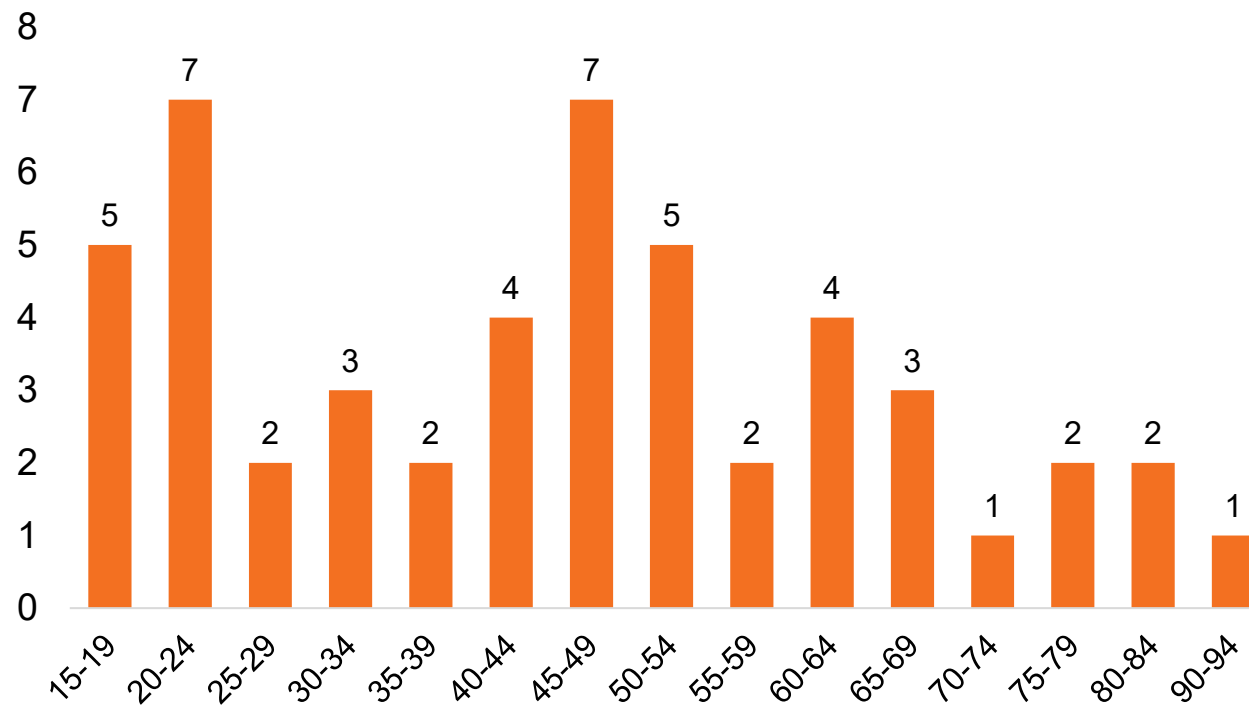




Driver Demographics in Fatal and Serious RLX Crashes FY 2010 – FY 2020



Drivers of crashed cars by gender



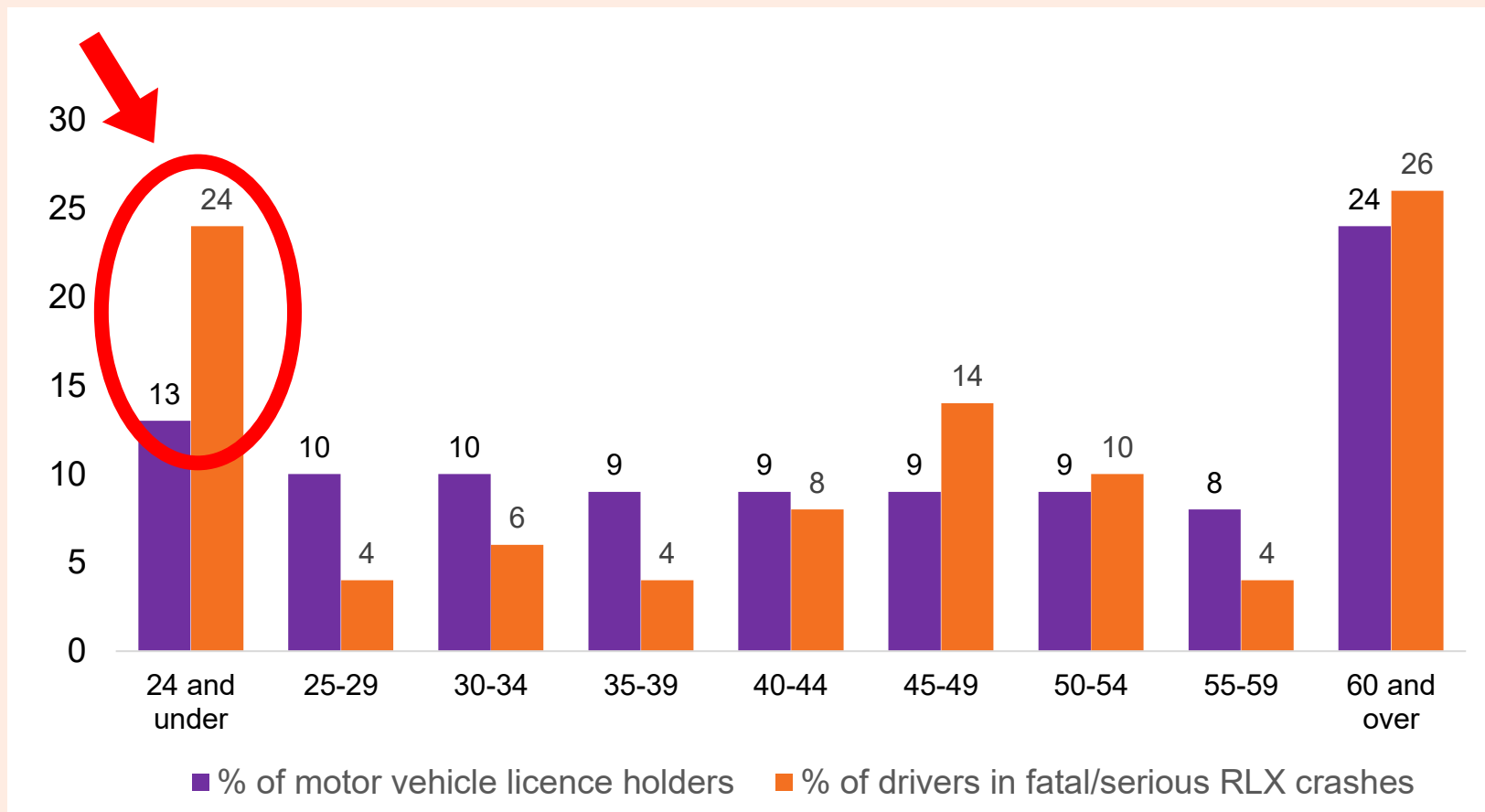
Drivers of crashed cars by age group

Interpretation:

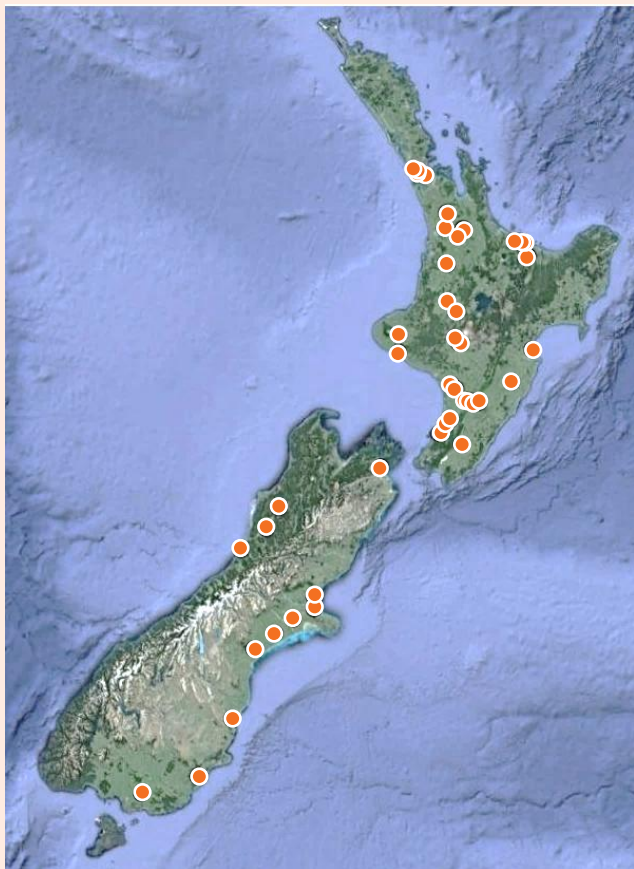
Drivers aged 24 and under are overrepresented in fatal/serious RLX crashes, compared to what we would expect when we consider the percentage of the motor vehicle licence holder population that they make up.



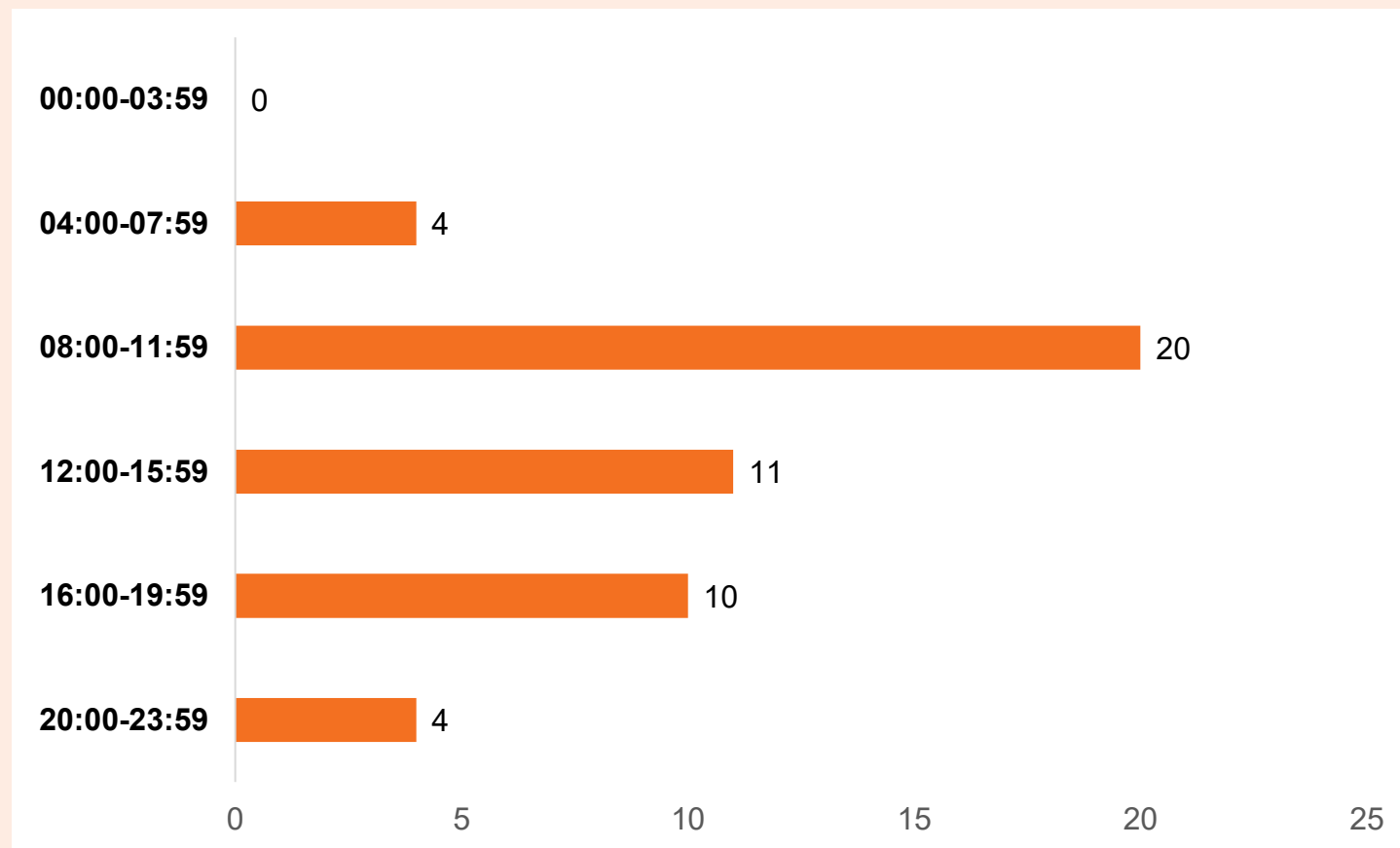
Percentages of NZ motor vehicle licence holders compared to drivers of crashed cars, by age group



Location and Time of Fatal and Serious RLX Crashes FY 2010 – FY 2020



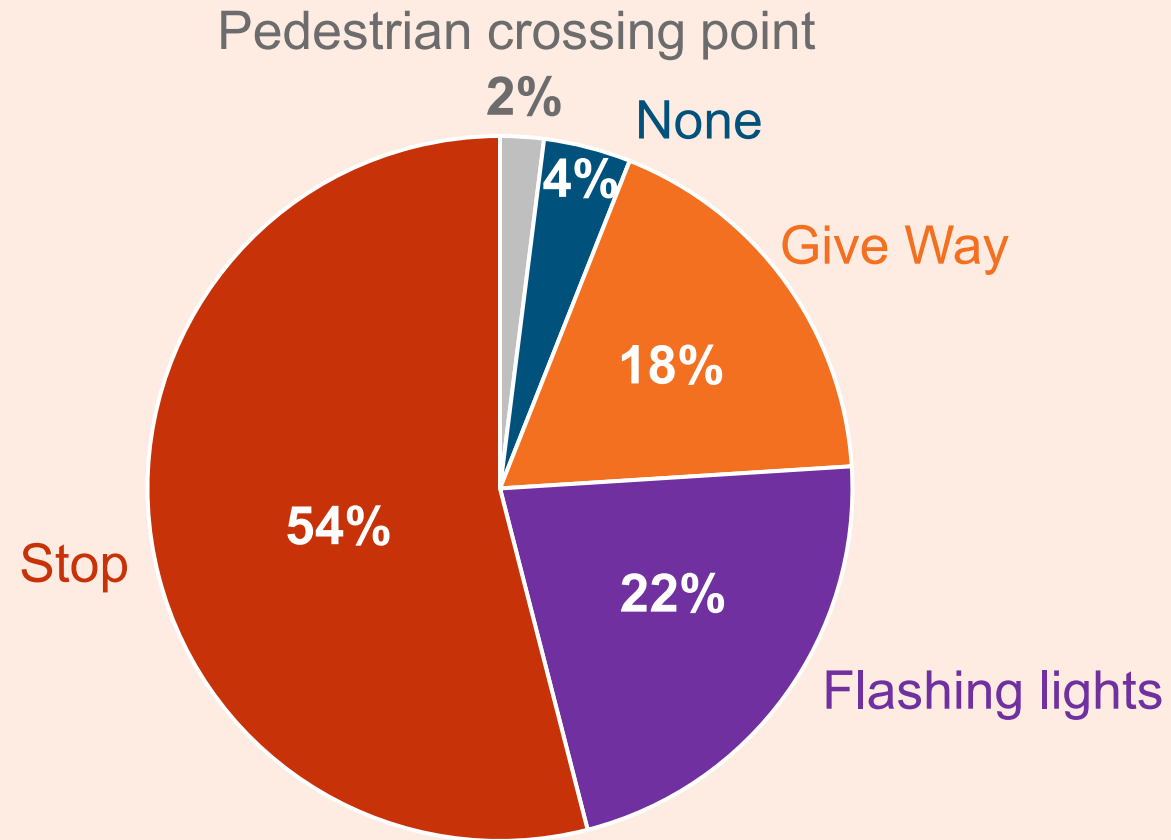
Location map of fatal and serious level crossing crashes

Signage at Sites of Fatal and Serious RLX Crashes FY 2010 – FY 2020





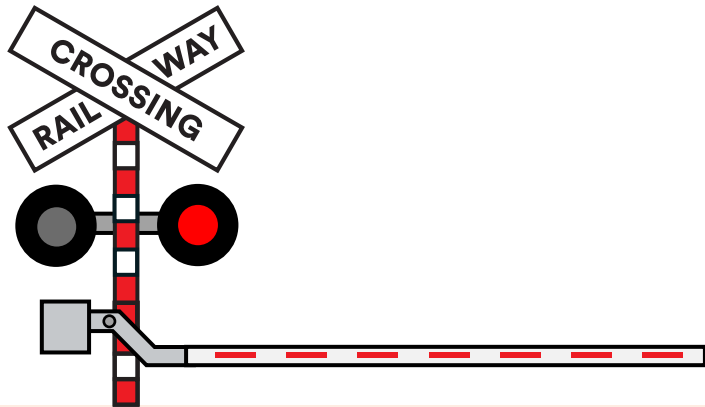
Our Key Messages

- Trains cannot stop in a hurry

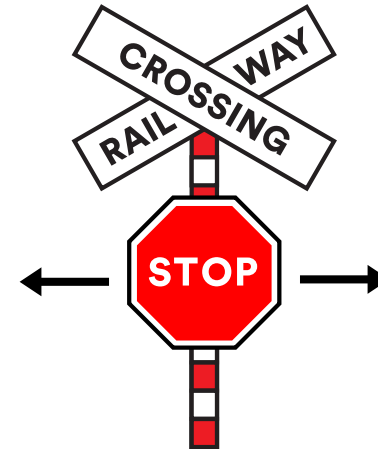

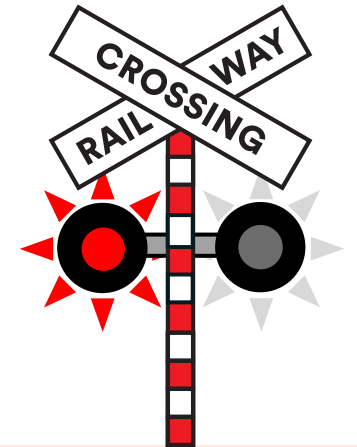
